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NEVADA SUB-STATE LABOR MARKET OVERVIEW

April 2020

This month in the Sub-State Nevada Labor Market Overview we will examine numerous economic indicators for the month of April. Beginning with a look at employment, active and inactive businesses, unemployment, and unemployment Insurance claims. We conclude with some additional unemployment services available

Employment

Employment estimates for this section come from the Current Employment Statistics (CES) program sponsored by the Bureau of Labor statistics (BLS). CES estimates are based on payroll information for the pay period containing the 12th of April. For more information on CES estimates in Nevada visit our CES page, <http://nevadaworkforce.com/CES>.

In April, seasonally adjusted employment decreased by 244,800 jobs, for Nevada, compared to March.

Seasonally adjusted estimates are determined by subtracting the expected seasonal movement from the unadjusted change in employment. This is done to account for commonly seen and expected changes in employment to determine underlying trends. All the State's MSAs showed decreases in employment compared to March. The Las Vegas decreased by 205,900 jobs, Reno metro saw a seasonal decrease of 27,100 jobs, and Carson City decreased by 4,000 jobs when compared to March. (Figure: 1)

Statewide jobs decreased by 18.0% the result of losing 254,800 jobs since April of last year. Nevada's Metro-

metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) all showed similar trends when compared to last year. Las Vegas was the hardest hit MSA losing 214,500 jobs a decay rate of 20.8% over the year. The Reno MSA decreased by 9.9% or a loss of 24,500 jobs. The Carson MSA decreased by 12.4% or the loss of 3,800 jobs over the year. (Figures 2 & 3).

Part of the reason that the Las Vegas MSA experienced such significant changes in employment levels is the concentration of businesses in leisure and hospitality and other industries that were impacted by the COVID-19 related business shutdown. Here we look at a breakout of essential and non-essential business concentration by metro area, balance of state (BOS), State, and the Nation. When comparing Clark, Washoe, Storey, Carson City, and the balance of state, we see that Clark county has the highest concentration of affected business employment, with 21.3% of its total employment deemed as nonessential. This is in line with the employment and unemployment numbers published in this document and contributed to the unemployment

rate of 33.5%. The next highest concentration is Washoe followed by the BOS at 11.7% and 9.1% respectively. As improvements in public health measures allow businesses to begin reopening across the state, we expect to see a corresponding increase in employment in the affected areas.

Nevada decreased by 242,600 jobs in service-providing industries, while goods-producing industries increased by 600 jobs. This increase is due to the Las Vegas MSA construction sector which added 3,800 jobs since last year. The goods-producing sector as a group in Las Vegas added 2,300 jobs. Service-providing industries in Las Vegas decrease by 216,000 jobs. References to goods-producing and service-providing estimates are not seasonally adjusted and should not be compared to the adjusted estimates. In Carson City, 3,800 jobs were lost relative to last year, the result of decreasing 3,400 service-providing and 400 goods-producing jobs. Reno saw a net decrease of 24,500 jobs split into decreases of 1,300 goods-producing and 23,200 service-providing jobs.

MSA Unemployment Rates

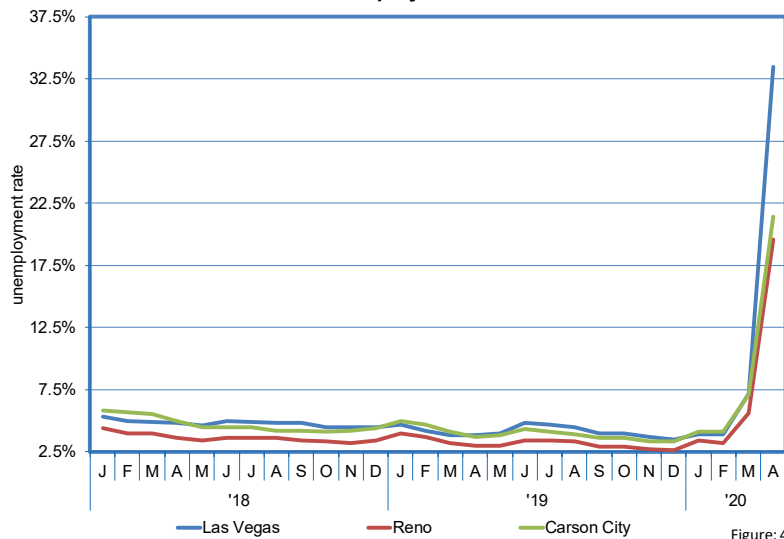

Unemployment

Figures for our unemployment estimates come from the Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) program. This program produces monthly and annual employment, unemployment, and labor force data for census regions, states, counties, metropolitan areas, and many large cities, based on place of residence. The State's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 28.2% in April, increas-

ing from 6.9% in March, and from 4.0% in April 2019. Unemployment rates for the State's metropolitan areas, counties, and cities reported in Figure 5 are not adjusted for seasonality. Hence, comparisons to the State's seasonally adjusted rate should be avoided. Legitimate comparisons, however, can be made to the State's unadjusted unemployment rate of 29.8% in April, up from 6.9% in March, and up from 3.9% in April 2019.

A summary of our sub-state unemployment rate estimates is presented in Figure: 5. This table gives estimates for the April unemployment rates, last year's unemployment rates, last month's unemployment rates, and the over-the-month (OTM) & over-the-year (OTY) changes for numerous areas across the state. Some of these areas include a Combined statistical area which is an economically integrated region with high rates of individuals who commute for work. Additionally, state specific areas are not endorsed or published by the BLS but are published by the state.

Unemployment rates increased in all regions across Nevada. In April 2020 the state's MSAs and combined statistical area unemployment rates have all seen increases in unemployment to levels at or near historical highs. The highest unemployment rates were seen in the Las Vegas area with the MSA having a rate of 33.5% up from 4% this time last year. In the Carson MSA the unemployment rate was at 21.4% up from 4% in April 2019, and the Reno MSA is at a 19.6% unemployment rate increased from 3.3% last year. (Figures: 4 & 5)

In the counties and cities, Eureka County had the states lowest unemployment rate at 6.5%, and Clark County had the highest at 33.5%. Many of the Cities in the Las Vegas MSA also had high unemployment rates with Las Vegas and North Las Vegas above 30%, and Hen-

person at 29.2%. (Figure: 5)

Unemployment Insurance Benefits

In April, unemployment insurance (UI) claims activity continued to see unprecedented levels across all counties in Nevada. Initial claims, which totaled more than 200,000 in April, with over 75 percent of initial claims coming from Clark County. Continued claims, which can act as a proxy for the number of persons filing for regular UI benefits, have grown in every county. By the end of April, there were over 252,000 continued claims a week in Clark County, more than 32,000 in Washoe County, and over 15,500 in the remaining counties. Continued claims levels are likely to see further increases in May as the statewide Covid-19-related business closures remain in place. Payment activity increased significantly in the month, with over 167,000 claimants receiving first payments. A total of \$287 million was paid to UI claimants, \$241 million, or 84 percent, to claimants residing in Clark County. Washoe County saw claimants receive nearly \$28 million in benefits, while the remaining counties in the state received \$12.7 million. Average weekly benefit payments, which were \$359 statewide in April, were as low as \$281 and as high as \$430 depending on the county of residence.

Nevada Unemployment Services Available

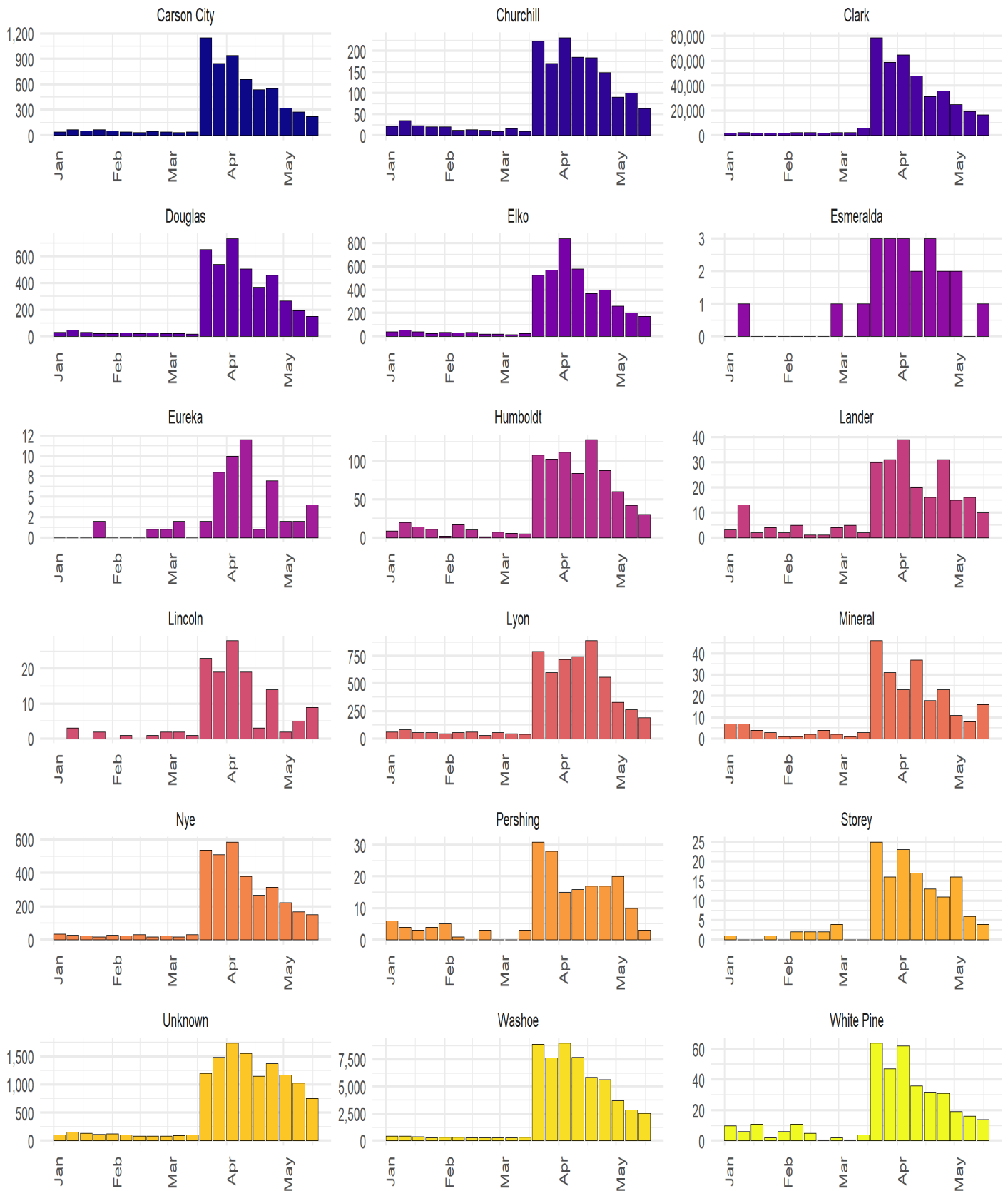
Pandemic Unemployment Assistance

In response to COVID-19, DETR has implemented and launched a new filing system for Nevada residents who have been affected by the pandemic to receive benefits. This is separate from filing; for traditional unemployment insurance benefits. Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) is a new temporary federal program that is part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. The PUA program is available retroactive to February 2, 2020 through December 26, 2020 and provides up to 39 weeks of benefits to eligible individuals.

PUA is separate from unemployment insurance and provides coverage only to individuals who are not eligible for regular unemployment insurance. PUA is

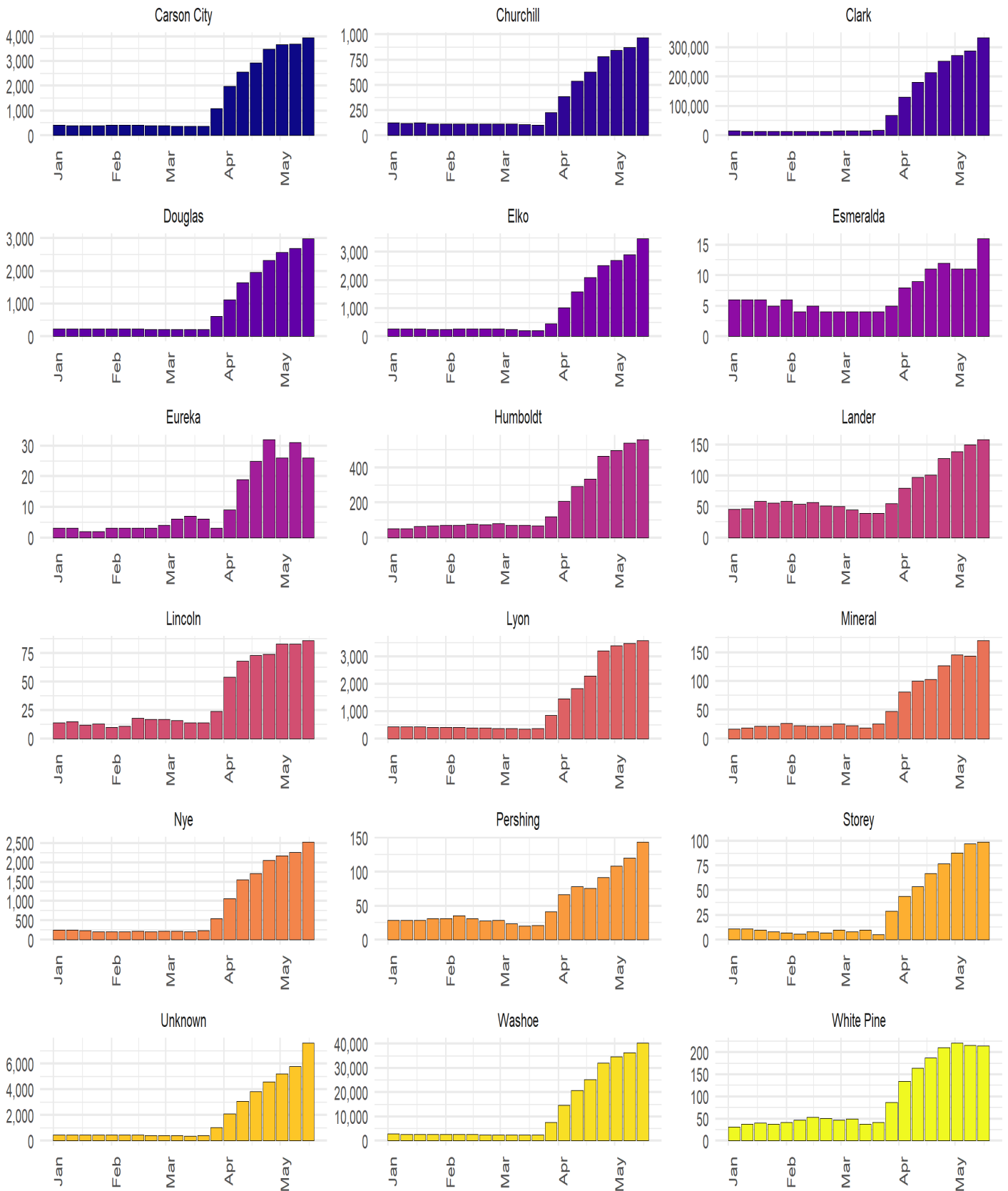
Initial Claims County

available to Nevada workers who are unemployed, partially unemployed, unable to work or unavailable for work due to the COVID-19 pandemic and who are not eligible for unemployment insurance benefits. This includes many different groups of people: self-employed, 1099 contract workers, gig workers, employees whose wages are not reported for unemployment insurance, employees who have not earned enough wages or worked enough hours for regular unemployment benefits and individuals who were going to start work but could not due to COVID-19 pandemic.

Unemployment and Reemployment Services

Are you an employer who needs to register for UI? Please visit our online portal <http://ui.nv.gov/ess.html>.

Are you an employee who lost your job? You may be eligible to collect unemployment benefits while you're out of work. In Nevada, unemployment claims can be filed online at <http://ui.nv.gov/css.html> or by telephone. With the convenience of 24-hr filing, claimants are highly encouraged to use the internet to file their UI claims.

Make sure you have all the necessary claim filing information available prior to logging on to the website or calling the telephone claim center. When you file online, you will be prompted to establish a unique PIN number at the time of initial claim filing (via internet or telephone). Our Internet claim filing system also requires a unique username and password be established at the time of registration. Once you complete your claim submittal, you will receive an internet claim confirmation number. Failure to receive a confirmation number upon filing your claim means your claim for benefits could be incomplete and may not be processed.

The following information is required to file a claim:

Names, addresses, phone number(s), and dates you

worked for your last two employers. A list of names (corporate name) of all employers you have worked for in the last 18 months. If you are not a citizen of the U.S., you MUST have your alien registration number and expiration date. If you have been discharged from the military in the last 18 months, you MUST have a copy of your DD-214 (Member 4). If you have worked for the federal government in the last 18 months, you MUST have a copy of your SF-8 or SF-50

Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act

The Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act (WARN) protects workers, their families, and communities by requiring employers with 100 or more employees (generally not counting those who have worked less than six months in the last 12 months and those who work an average of less than 20 hours a week) to provide at least 60 calendar days advance written notice of a potential plant closing and mass lay-off affecting 50 or more employees at a single site of employment. WARN makes certain exceptions to the requirements when layoffs occur due to unforeseeable business circumstances, faltering companies, and natural disasters. Advance notice gives workers and their families some transition time to adjust to the prospective loss of employment, to seek and obtain other jobs, and if necessary, to enter skill training or retraining that will allow these workers to compete successfully in the job market. Regular federal, state, local, and federally recognized Indian Tribal government entities that provide public services are not covered. Nevada Services for Employers and Unemployed Workers
Rapid Response- Employer Services

The U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) and our State and local workforce investment system partners offer many services to help businesses and workers deal with the effects of layoffs and plant closures, including

those that result from increased competition from imports, natural disasters, and other events.

One such service is Rapid Response (RR). RR teams will work with employers and any employee representative(s) to quickly maximize public and private resources to minimize disruptions associated with job loss.

DETR's Statewide RR department was designated by the governor to ensure delivery of comprehensive workforce services to businesses in transition and workers facing dislocation due to layoffs and/or business closures of any size that meet Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act (WARN) and non-WARN instances. Nevada's RR unit consists of individuals from the local boards, dislocated worker service providers, and DETR's Employment Security Division (ESD). The team endeavors to educate businesses and dislocated workers about services and information available through federal, state and local organizations to reduce the effects of businesses in transition. Additionally, the team makes every effort to conduct immediate and on-site assessments with employers and worker representatives to evaluate the specific needs of the event and to provide intervention services which include layoff aversion activities when possible. Layoff aversion activities are provided through the coordination of other programs/state agencies and entities through DETR's ESD. Nevada's RR unit endorses all activities necessary to plan and furnish services that assist businesses in transition and enable dislocated workers to transition into employment as quickly as possible.

Currently, with COVID-19, the RR unit is exploring alternative program delivery methods to allow for the development of virtual RR resource delivery and emailing the "Rapid Response Resource packets" to employers and affected workers which contain valuable information on unemployment insurance, health care, retirement, welfare and legal information. Workforce Investment Support Services (WISS)

Due to COVID-19 and the Governor's March 12, 2020 Emergency Order 2020-03-12 Declaration of Emergency for COVID-19, a significant number of workforce staff have been reassigned to assist unemployment insurance activities. DETR's workforce case management system reporting indicates the following March 2020 performance indicator outcomes:

Employment Services:

Number of job seekers registered: 137,400 job seekers registered for employment services March 2020, which is 1,427 percent above the planned goal of 9,000. The unprecedented number of UI applications received is the primary source that contributed to this increase. In March, more claims were received since the Governor's order than in all of 2019.

Labor Exchange Services:

There were 2,371 of job orders from employers in March 2020, which is 48 percent above the planned goal of 1,565. The COVID-19 crisis increased the need for additional staff in different occupations such as delivery and grocery stock clerk.

Job openings from employers totaled 6,192 open positions in March 2020, which is 57 percent above the planned goal of 3,950. Positions remained open from job orders entered earlier in the month. Some openings were as a result of a shift in need for additional staff in different occupations. This high number was also due to two seafood processing jobs that were posted at the beginning of the month accounting for more than 450 of these openings.

Veterans registering in March 2020 totaled 4,675, which is 1,069 percent above than the planned goal of 400. The mandatory statewide closing of businesses ordered by the Governor caused the increase of veterans applying for unemployment insurance. The number of potential SBE veterans was 11.69 times the normal number of Veterans filing for unemployment insurance.

The BDA which makes medical determinations of eligibility for Social Security Administration disability benefit payment programs. Finally, the BEN program, which provides blind
